## **Assessment comments**

In the second opportunity, in July, students will have to write an essay about the texts studied (4-6 pages, 60% of the final grade) and the exam (40% of the final grade). Students who have submitted satisfactory work during the course will not be required to submit any additional work in the second opportunity.

Turnitin may be used to check the originality of work completed outside of the classroom, including wrong citations, plagiarism or any other type of academic fraud. Students who do not show up at either of the tests will be marked "Absent" ("Non presentado") if they have not turned in more than 50% of the gradeable activities.
