Methodologies	Description



Oral presentation	<p>The students will defend their TFG publicly and face-to-face. If a student should request, providing reasons and justification, to defend their TFG in a distance rather than face-to-face manner, they will need to do so before the Study Programme Board, a department of the Governing Council, in order to authorise it or not. This will be done provided that the required legal, technical, administrative and economic conditions are met. The completion, presentation and defence of the TFG may be carried out in any of the languages using the teaching of the course, in accordance with the provisions of the degree verification report.</p> <p>The panel will inform each student of the maximum amount of time they have to defend their TFG, during which they must set out the objectives, methodology, content and conclusions of their work. At the end the student must answer any questions put to them by members of the assessment panel and respond to any clarifications, comments and suggestions.</p>
Supervised projects	<p>Methodology designed to encourage the students to learn independently, under the guidance of the tutor and in various settings (academic and professional). The main emphasis focuses on learning 'how to do things?'. It is an option based on students taking responsibility for their own learning.</p> <p>This teaching system is based on two basic elements: the independent learning of the students and the monitoring of this learning by the teacher-tutor.</p>
Document analysis	<p>The student must analyse the legal and caselaw sources in the appropriate way in order to rule on the case or to produce the proposed report correctly.</p>

Supervised projects	<p>The TFG will be led by a member of the teaching staff of the departments who teaches full-time in the degree study programme.</p> <p>The teacher will be responsible for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Explaining to the students whose tutoring encompasses the characteristics of the work, and guiding them in their development; b) Monitoring the preparation of the TFG and ensuring that the established objectives are met; c) Authorising the presentation and defence of the TFG.

Assessment comments



Once the student has presented the work, the panel will deliberate on the grade to be awarded to the student. The evaluation criteria of the teaching guide and the provisions of the degree verification report will be applied. The criteria will be made public before students defend their TFG. For the final mark, the arithmetic mean of the marks awarded to the TFG by each of the members of the panel will be established. In the last scheduled sessions the panel will apply the following criteria to the oral presentation: up to 20% for the TFG presentation and up to 30% for the questions and answers section.

The mark will be awarded based on the following numerical scale established in Royal Decree 1125/2003, from 0 to 10, with one decimal place, to which the corresponding qualitative mark must be added:

- a) 0-4.9 fail
- b) 5.0-6.9 pass
- c) 7.0-8.9 good
- d) 9.0-10 excellent

Students who achieve a mark equal to or greater than 9.0, according to the assessment panel's criteria, may be awarded First Class Honours.

Any review and/or complaint regarding the final TFG marks will be addressed in accordance with UDC regulations.

With regards the TFG, it is an indispensable requirement that the students have passed all the subjects of the Law Degree. The regulations allow the students to submit the TFG while they are still yet to pass some subjects, but they may only defend the TFG when they have passed all the subjects of the Law Degree.
